RELIGIOUS SERVICES IN APRIL

The Theme for April is *Interdependence*

Our theme for the month of April is *Interdependence*, which speaks to our 7th principle: "Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part." Spring is a wonderful time of year to experience this in nature—the weather warms, more birds return with their delightful singing, we see buds on the trees, and more smiles on people's faces. <u>April 7th at 10 AM</u> – *This Land Is Your Land, This Land Is My Land*, led by John McWilliam; service associate Joanie Thompson. Who really owns the land we live on? Are we responsible for the sins of our fathers? John is a longtime member of UU Falmouth.

<u>April 14th at 10 AM</u>—*Solomon's Story, Ministry, and Journey to Harvard Divinity School,* led by Pastor Solomon Kwaghko; service associate Charlotte Harris. Pastor Solomon will explain how our stories can provide lenses that we can use to see God's presence or absence in our lives. When we put our stories into proper perspective, they help us better appreciate other humans. Our stories are a powerful tool that we can use to drive revolutionary change in our communities.

Solomon Kwaghko is a pastoral care provider in Nigeria with Evangelical Church Winning All (ECWA). He has served in various church contexts for over a decade. Solomon is the founder and team lead of The Ordinary People's Hub (TOP-Hub) – a community action network that empowers artisans to drive revolutionary change. He is on study leave at Harvard Divinity School pursuing a master's degree in Religion, Literature and Culture.

<u>April 21st at 10 AM</u>—<u>A Celebration of the Earth</u>, led by Social and Environmental Action Committee Members. Celebrate *Earth Day Sunday* with us! Kitty Hendricks-Miller, the Indian Education Director for the Mashpee Wampanoag Tribe, will play the cedar flute, lead us in prayer, plus share stories, songs, and insights into Wampanoag history, traditional arts, and ways of life.

Hello Members and Friends,

UU Falmouth's theme for April, *Interdependence*, is particularly apropos for us. We absolutely depend on one another to sustain this Fellowship. Not only financially, but spiritually, we need to know and feel in accord with one another to feel our spirits rise. We have a new plan to help us with that.

By now you have received by email the plan the Governing Board approved for our next three years, July 2024 to June 2027. Its goals are to enrich our spiritual life, build enduring friendships among us, improve the world through service, and sustain and grow the Fellowship. It isn't a detailed plan, that work is up to the committees and pop-up work groups, but an aspirational plan. The planners hope that every member and many friends will read the plan with the intention of finding direction for themselves in it.

Please, as you read and reread the plan, ask yourself what you can do to bring this plan to life, now and over the next three years.

At its March meeting, the Governing Board took another consequential step: it approved Larry Ladd to lead a mini-search* for a part-time minister. It was an easy vote. Larry's profession is advising boards of universities on leadership and he is a long-time advisor to the UUA, our denomination's central organization. When I asked him if he would help us he said, "Yes, but with one condition." "Oh, what's that?" "That I'm the chair and I get to pick my team." Another easy decision—usually getting someone to take responsibility for chairing is the hardest ask. Larry will be filling in his team soon because we would like a choice for a part-time contract minister made by the congregation at or soon after the start of the next fiscal year. Please wish Larry the best of luck.

Two other items on the March agenda you should know about. First, the Social and Environmental Action Committee will be surveying the congregation to identify a cause the whole congregation can get behind in force. Watch for it. And second but sooner, the indefatigable Ellen Todd and John Jackson are leading this fiscal year's auction. This year's budget counts on \$15,000 from fundraisers so please donate goods and/or services very soon and mark your calendar for a potluck and auction Saturday, April 13 at 5 PM.

Farming Falmouth Presentation

Wednesday, April 17 at 6 PM at the Meeting House and via Zoom

Farming Falmouth is a young, fast-growing organization that supports local agriculture and believes in bringing people closer to where and how their food is grown. With some of the best soils on Cape Cod, and miles of waterfront, our coastal town has the potential to produce a diversity of food and seafood,



and do it in thoughtful, fair, and sustainable ways. The more food we can grow locally—on our farms, in our bays and estuaries, in schools, in community gardens and backyards—the more we can lighten our environmental footprint and widen access to fresh food throughout the community.

Jeny Christian will talk with us about Farming Falmouth and her service garden at Andrew's Farm, with a new site to open at Peterson's Farm in April. She will tell us about their hands-on educational workshops for home gardeners, homesteaders, and small scale farmers. (All workshops are filmed and edited for access on YouTube and FCTV.)

Volunteer opportunities are available for all fitness levels. Help expand Farming Falmouth's service garden on Andrew's Farm where crops are grown for donation to the Falmouth Service Center. (More than 900 pounds of food were donated last year.) Help plan and prepare a series of educational workshops for the public. L.I.N.K. (Linking Indigenous & Non-Indigenous Knowledge) Program

The 4th in the 2024 Education Series: *Historical Trauma* Saturday, April 20 from 1-3 PM at the Meeting House

The processes of colonization and the aftermath of King Philip's War resulted in far-reaching and damaging consequences that tumbled down through generations of Wampanoag people. It has affected Indigenous people around the globe and is collectively known as "Historical Trauma." This presentation will discuss aspects of this trauma from past and present perspectives.

Linda Coombs is an author and historian from the Wampanoag Tribe of Aquinnah and lives in the Wampanoag community of Mashpee. She is the author of the recently published young adult/children's book *Colonization and the Wampanoag Story*.



L.I.N.K. is a local non-profit Cape Cod organization seeking pathways to understanding and reciprocity between the non-Native community and the Wampanoag Nation. L.I.N.K. seeks active collaboration with community groups and organizations like UU Falmouth to change the current environment of societal injustice and to heal relations.

UU Falmouth is collaborating with L.I.N.K. to offer these monthly events with educators from the Wampanoag Tribe to teach the local, non-Native community about the true history and culture of the Wampanoag people. Starting Point Program

The Membership Committee is offering a unique program designed for Members, Friends and newcomers. UU Falmouth is at an inflection point and the committee believes that **Starting Point** could be useful to us all as we seek to heal disconnections and grow a welcoming UU community for the Upper Cape.

At the March 24 service, we introduced this program, inspired by the UU slogan "deeds not creeds." **Starting Point** does not present a set of beliefs, but rather many opportunities to experience the deep listening and sharing practices inherent in UU small groups. Participants are invited to look within themselves for direction in their spiritual journey and are asked to prepare for each of four session topics:

- **Session 1 Your Journey**
- Session 2 The UU Journey and the Journey of UU Falmouth
- Session 3 Our Journey Together The 3 Paths of Unitarian Universalism
- Session 4 Finding Your Journey Group

The program promises several takeaways: an understanding of UU history and the history of this congregation, a new connection to your fellow participants, an experience of UU small group practices, and a sense of the next step in your spiritual journey. It is important to commit to all 4 sessions, either in person or by Zoom.

COMMUNICATIONS: Our website is undergoing an unprecedented number of hacking attempts, plus an equal number of attempts to create new usernames and passwords. This is caused by bots, not people. Joanie Thompson gets an email each time there is an attempt. She is currently getting 30-50 emails per day notifying her of these brute force attacks. Other UU webmasters are having similar experiences.

Wordfence, our firewall, is being overly cautious. If you have been blocked from the Member portion of the website, contact Joanie and she will use a workaround to get you back in. Some members have had to unplug their router and use their phone to access the site.

SOCIAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL ACTION:

UUs working together to Get Out the Vote! SEAC will be hosting a brief GOTV information session directly following the Earth Day Sunday service on April 21. This congregation-wide project in support of the 5th UU Principle aims to enhance representation of groups that are often marginalized, while also building community within our Fellowship as we work together. Come learn how you can be a part of it!



Take-a-Bag/Fill-a-Bag: UU Falmouth donated 70+ bags for Belonging to Each Other—more than any other participant! These have been distributed to hotels and the police station for people in need. The initiative is over for this season.

Food card sales continue to provide revenue for our donations to local organizations. January sales = \$5,760; February sales = \$4,040.

Tarp Collection: Eight tarps, one tent, and one raincoat have been donated to the AIDS Support Group of Cape Cod (ASGCC). The effort has ended for this season.

Share the Plate recipient for April will be Farming Falmouth (see page 3). A donation of \$258 in February went to GLBTQ Legal Advocates & Defenders (GLAD). March's donation went to WeCan (amount TBD). Our May recipient will be the Cape Cod Foster Closet.
