This month's Soul Matters theme is **Choosing Hope**. There is a saying that "Hope has two beautiful daughters. Their names are Anger and Courage. Anger at the way things are, and Courage to see that they do not remain as they are." May we endeavor to keep a balance in our anger and courage during these challenging times!

December 7 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—"Jubilee of Hope" led by Rev. Rali Weaver; service associate, Julie DeSorgher. As we approach this season, we embrace a powerful theme proposed by the Catholic Church: The Jubilee Year of Hope. Rooted in ancient traditions of release, renewal, and restoration, Jubilee calls us to imagine a world made whole—where debts are forgiven, the land rests, and justice is restored. In a world immersed in uncertainty and change, what does it mean to declare a year of hope? How do we live into that promise, both personally and collectively? Join us this Sunday as we explore the spiritual call of Jubilee and how UUs can be agents of healing, liberation, and hope in our communities and beyond.

Dear UU Falmouth Friends.

At UU Falmouth, we deeply value community, connection, and honoring the inherent worth and dignity of every person. In that spirit, I invite us to explore a powerful idea: offering Community Living Wakes for those we love who are facing the end of their lives and feel at a loss about how to say goodbye.

We are all familiar with the traditional wake or funeral—a vital gathering that honors a life after it has ended. What if instead we shifted some of that heartfelt celebration and sharing to a time when the person can still be an active, present participant? Why wait until someone dies to hear their favorite songs and tell them that we love them?

The spark for this idea came from my own family. For his 90th birthday, my father—who usually avoids being the center of attention—expressed grief at having the equipment to throw parties but not doing so anymore. I convinced him to let us throw, not just one, but two celebrations. These were amazing opportunities for him to be surrounded by those he loves, listen to his favorite music, and hear wonderful stories about his life. Though my father is 92 and that celebration was a bit premature, it was a profound, life-affirming event.

Historically, the Irish Wake was a boisterous, often joyful, social gathering—a full-throated community celebration of life's vibrant energy. The Living Wake takes this idea and flips the timing.

When a loved one receives a difficult or terminal diagnosis, or reaches a marked birth year anniversary, a Living Wake offers a radical choice: to gather the community now, while the ones we care about are still here to hear the laughter, feel the hugs, and enjoy the celebration.

Imagine telling those we care about, face-to-face, how profoundly they have impacted our lives, and knowing for sure they hear every word. The person can share their favorite memories and offer guidance or wisdom to their loved ones while still alive, and we, too, get to share our love for them.

The author Mitch Albom chronicled the final lessons of his former professor, Morrie Schwartz, who chose to embrace his ALS diagnosis as a chance to connect more deeply. Morrie taught us: "Once you learn how to die, you learn how to live."

A Living Wake embodies this wisdom. It isn't just about preparing for death; it's a profound, life-affirming act of community love and presence. It allows us to fully be with each other, embracing the profound gift of connection.

If you are interested in starting this tradition at UU Falmouth, let us meet after the new year to start planning. If you think this is an inappropriate idea, I would be interested to hear that too.

So rather than summarize the minutes, I'd like to share something I have been noticing about conversations. Many conversations are like ping pong matches. One says this, the other disagrees and offers a rebuttal. Conversation becomes more of a debate than a dialog. I catch myself ping ponging and try to avoid it but it's hard, for me at least. Going into Thanksgiving with all its conversational opportunities, I plan to practice dialog. I'll try to listen for what I agree with and try to build on that. Instead of "No, but..." I'll hope to say, "Yes, you're right, and..."

Think back to your school days when you learned about Venn diagrams, the overlapping circles that showed similarities and differences between data sets or opinions. If you picture your conversations with others as Venn diagrams, you can find the overlaps, the areas of agreement, to be acknowledged before going on to facts and opinions outside the overlap. Hopefully, there will always be some agreement to express sincerely. Our family Thanksgiving is at my house this year after many years in Connecticut, and I tend to get more proprietary and bossy in my own house. We'll see how putting a cap on it works this year.

Financially, the congregation is strong. Participation is strong. The activity level is good. Spiritually—well, we each have to gauge that for ourselves. Myself, I'm glad to be home. Best wishes to you all for a wonderful holiday season.

December 14, 2025: The United Nation World Food Programme is the largest humanitarian organization saving and changing lives worldwide. It brings life-saving relief in emergencies, and uses food assistance to build a pathway to peace, stability, and prosperity for people recovering from conflicts, disasters, and the impacts of climate change. It has a presence in over 120 countries, including those across the Caribbean who are suffering from the effects of Hurricane Melissa, half a million Palestinians in Gaza facing catastrophic levels of hunger and starvation, and over 300 million other people facing acute hunger across the globe.

December 24, 2025: Minister's Discretionary Fund. Did you know that every week, Rev. Rali receives urgent calls from people in the congregation and neighbors across the Cape who are struggling to bridge the gap between paychecks? For many, the high cost of living here means a single unexpected expense can lead straight to a housing crisis. Rev. Rali uses the Minister's Discretionary Fund to provide this emergency help quickly. This includes things like grocery cards, transportation, and critically needed emergency hotel rooms on cold winter nights for those facing eviction and homelessness so they can connect with long-term services.

On this Christmas Eve, the night the stories tell us a homeless family sought shelter, our UU Falmouth Fellowship continues its tradition: The entire offering will go directly to the Minister's Discretionary Fund to provide hope and immediate assistance to our most vulnerable neighbors.


