RELIGIOUS SERVICES IN FEBRUARY

Our theme for February is *Living Life Through the Practice of Inclusion*. According to the pioneering consultant and author Verna Myers, "Diversity is being invited to the party; inclusion is being asked to dance."

February 2 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom — "Draw the Circle Wide" led by Rev. Rali Weaver; service associate Steve Treistman. As we gather as a community united by our shared values and beliefs, we recognize the importance of embracing diversity and expanding our connections. The call to draw our Unitarian Universalist circle wider invites us to reflect on the ways we can welcome new perspectives, experiences, and stories into our midst. As we explore this theme, let us consider not only how we can enrich our own lives, but also how we can foster understanding and compassion in our broader communities.

February 9 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—"The Promise and the Perils of UUism" led by Larry Ladd; service associate Tedi Bell. What are the hopes, values and vision that hold us together as Unitarian Universalists? What are the fears and flaws that hold us back? How can we realize our potential?

February 16 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—"Scarcity vs. Vulnerability" led by Rev. Rali Weaver. This Sunday, we will explore Vulnerability and Scarcity. While they may seem interconnected, they represent distinct concepts in our emotional and social landscapes. Vulnerability refers to the state of being open to emotional exposure, risk, and uncertainty, often associated with bravery and authenticity in sharing our true selves with others. On the other hand, scarcity embodies a mindset rooted in lack—a belief that there are insufficient resources, whether they be time, love, or opportunities. We will ask if a scarcity mindset might be transformed into a vulnerability that will help us to effect more change in the world.

Share the Plate on February 16: The Los Angeles Regional Food Bank. The Los Angeles Regional Food Bank is working with government agencies, nonprofit and faith-based partners, and others to respond to the fires throughout Los Angeles County. The Food Bank collects food from hundreds of resources. With the help of hundreds of thousands of volunteers annually and an agency network of more than 600 partner agencies, they serve more than 900,000 people on a monthly basis. https://www.lafoodbank.org/. February 23 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—"We the People: Exploring Social Justice in Troubled Times" led by the Welcoming Congregation Committee with guest speaker Dr. Sandra Faiman-Silva; service associate Judy Andrade. From Dr. Silva: "An anthropological lens of inquiry has been instrumental in helping me as a teacher, scholar and activist to deconstruct some of the most pressing issues of our time and act to foster social change. What I believe are my most important contributions include a course I taught on *War, Peace, and Culture*; and my books on the Oklahoma Choctaw Nation and Provincetown, MA. I will share my work to show how and what we can learn from the 'puzzle of life' to be effective agents of both consciousness raising and activism." Her work offers lessons on how we can become agents of social change to address pressing antagonisms and conflicts today.

In January, I had the good fortune to attend three UU Falmouth-supported events. The first was the Reality Series Rudolf Oldenbourg and Steve Treistman dreamed up; the second was the Upper Cape Women's Coalition charrette; and finally, the "No Place for Hate" Martin Luther King Jr. Breakfast. In different ways, these three events gave me hope for the future in a month fraught with disappointments, and offered me pride in our UU congregational system of governance.

Classes like the Reality Series are the kind of intellectually stimulating and invigorating opportunities UU communities are known for but were often lost after the COVID-19 pandemic. Finding ways to revitalize our intellect after such isolation is problematic. A community of free and responsible searches for truth and meaning is what UU communities are uniquely equipped to foster.

While working on my (still incomplete) PhD in Transformative Studies at the California Institute of Integral Studies, I explored church decline and searched for markers of church vitality. My unproven theory is that collaborative congregations are more vital and sustainable than isolated or internally focused congregations. The wisdom of your Governance Board to share space with groups like the Upper Cape Women's Coalition is a perfect example of the collaborative efforts necessary to grow congregations. Over 70 women from the Upper Cape gathered to brainstorm solutions to the impending crisis for women in the face of the change in administration. While there is no linear line to 70 people showing up on a Saturday and the same 70 people showing up on Sunday morning, a congregation that sanctions its buildings and grounds with people of similar values helps to amplify our work in the world.

Finally, the MLK breakfast started at UU Falmouth. To be a founder of critical social movements and then allow them to take on a life of their own is, in many ways, the best way to live our values in the world. We can't do everything, nor would we want to! When we can fill vital civic needs and make it so attractive that others take credit for it, that is the best way to make the world more UU.

Even when you cannot attend every event or take the reins of every planning session, it must feel good to be part of a community that furthers values of love, justice, and acceptance in the world. As I reflect on these events, I'm reminded of the incredible strength of our shared UU values: our commitment to community, to justice, and to the ongoing search for truth. It's not always easy, and we certainly don't do it alone—but together, we make a difference one thoughtful conversation, one shared experience, and one act of kindness at a time.

So, whether you've attended these gatherings or not, I invite you to take pride in the ways our congregation is growing, learning, and impacting the wider world. Our work is far from over, but I have hope in the direction we're headed. I'm so grateful to be on this journey with all of you.

President's Corner



Dear Members and Friends

We might be getting a full-time minister sooner than you think. In December the Governing Board moved the target date for calling a full-time minister up from July 2027 to July 2026 because we felt the congregation is eager for this change. We know this means that the stewardship campaign this year has to focus on the full-time ministry goal. The results of the campaign will tell us if we can do it.

Last week for the January Board meeting, anticipating that the congregation will rise to the challenge, we invited Larry Ladd to update us on ministerial search processes. He described the UUA's process for a "contract to call" ministerial search in which the congregation would not do a full-scale ministerial search, but rather decide whether to call Rali Weaver as our settled, full-time minister. That's a big step that requires careful discernment within the congregation of our current and future needs and opportunities. It also requires deep conversation with Rali and her own consideration of whether such a move is what she wants to do at this stage in her career.

Larry advised us to use the "contract to call" process for two reasons:

1.) the congregation seems to like Rali enough for her to be a very strong inside candidate, which will discourage other candidates and

2.) the pool of available UU ministers is very small, especially if you add in the cost of housing in our area. There's a third reason to use this simpler process: Rali's other congregation, Dedham UU, has initiated a search for a called minister creating the potential for us to lose our contract minister if we don't step up our own process.

Therefore, soon, during a Sunday service the congregation will learn about both the "contract to call" process and the difference between a contract and a called minister. Some months later, the process will conclude with a vote by the members of the congregation because it's the congregation, not the Board, that calls the settled minister. Expect more on this in the days to come.

On behalf of the congregation, thank you to **Carol Ann Cronon** for her service on the Governing Board. The Board accepted her resignation with sadness and heartfelt best wishes for her return to good health. And thank you **Steve Treistman** for creating a Wednesday night series about reality seen through the lens of the speaker's professional experience. Steve, a biologist and the first speaker, taught us a fascinating lesson: all animate creatures have evolved to fill a niche in their environment. The next eight speakers are also part of our congregation. (See page 5 for a full description of upcoming sessions.)

This Year's Pledge Drive Will Be Starting Soon! Pre-Kickoff Planning Meeting—Sunday, February 16




We invite everyone interested in being part of this year's canvass team to please come to a pre-kickoff planning meeting, Sunday, February 16th after the Sunday service.

"Exploring the Nature of Reality" Series Continues... 2nd and 4th Wednesdays from 7-8:15 PM at the Meeting House and via Zoom (UU Falmouth members/friends only)



Please join us for a bi-weekly series "Exploring the Nature of "Reality." Each session will have a facilitator who will present different perspectives on reality and opportunities to explore them individually and as a group. This is the beginning of a pilot program that we may expand upon later.

February 12, 2025 "Our Psychology and Subjectivity" – Lew Stern. What each of us experiences as "real" depends on who we are psychologically: our past experiences, beliefs, emotions, hopes, and perspectives. We also share group realities with those around us: our family, culture, and peers. We will explore our unique individual and shared realities and how they impact us by observing and participating in experiences together and in small groups. Note: This session will NOT be available in person. It will be presented in a webinar format available only via Zoom.

February 26, 2025 "**How We Relate and Come to Agreement**" – **Sangaku Dan Joslyn.** Reality is relational as opposed to absolute and, as such, there is a quality of depth and interconnectedness that is hard to fathom. We use agreement as a way to label things. We do so in all directions and in all flavors of a thing to reach absolute agreement on what it is, causing disagreement about certitude.

March 12, 2025 "How We Know About the World Around Us: The First Steps of Sensory Inputs" – Rudolf Oldenbourg. We learn about the world around us through our senses, of which we have five on first count: sight, hearing, smell, taste, and touch. From the time we are born, even before, our brain receives and integrates these different inputs and forms our experience of the world around us by literally recreating it. Because the brain recreates the outer world, the creation is necessarily subjective, as it is derived from the physical sensory inputs and their interpretation based on our past experiences. In my contribution to this series on reality as we experience it, I plan to examine the physical nature of the signals and the first steps of detecting them to form the input for our senses. Many of the contributions by others in this series are covering the further processing of these basic sensory inputs so we can survive, procreate, and together thrive in this world.

March 26, 2025 "How We Measure Things" – John Jackson. How do we measure reality? John has spent his career "measuring." But is there a truly unambiguous value that can be attached to any of the things that we measure and feel comfortable assigning a number to?

April 9, 2025 "Is Our Sense of Self Too Narrow? You and Your Trillions of Microbiome Friends" – Jessica Mark Welch and Betsy Wilder. We'll discuss the microbiome and our sense that we are human, but *in reality* are mostly microbial in terms of our cell numbers and DNA coding potential. Our microbiomes likely change our moods and behaviors as well as our health status.

April 23, 2025 "Views of Reality: A Synthesis of the Presentations and Discussions" – Ensemble led by Steve Treistman.

L.I.N.K. Programs Continue in 2025

As part of the Martin Luther King Jr. Breakfast annual celebration on January 20, the Linking Indigenous & Non-Indigenous Knowledge group (L.I.N.K.) was honored as the recipient of the No Place for Hate Civic Leadership Award. Their commitment to building bridges in our community was one of the key elements of their work that brought them this honor. Their spokeswomen explained the origins of the group and the valuable support they received from UU Falmouth during 2024. Most of their educational and informational sessions were held in our Meeting House and were attended by 100 or more people each time! While they will not be holding monthly programs this year, they will have periodic presentations throughout 2025. The next one will take place on March 1 at Mashpee High School.
