RELIGIOUS SERVICES IN JANUARY

The theme for January is "Living Love Through the Practice of Story." In her article entitled, "Own Our History. Change the Story." Brené Brown writes "When we deny our stories, they define us. When we own our stories, we get to write a brave new ending..."

January 5 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom — "Agnotology and the Stories That Shape Our Reality" led by Rev. Rali Weaver; service associate Tedi Bell. Agnotology is the study of how ignorance and doubt are deliberately spread to influence opinion, sell products, or win favor. This Sunday, we will explore how cultural falsehoods have been made to shape our reality.

January 12 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—"Wherever You Are" led by Marney Rathbun, Harvard Divinity School student and WHOI Chaplain; service associate Julie DeSorgher. In times of great uncertainty, it can seem like there are no models for how to move forward. Marney's sermon will use the stories of our neighbors as examples of how to face the transitions of the coming months with openness and grace.

January 19 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—"Radical Love" led by Rev. Rali Weaver; service associate Joanne Treistman. What is unconditional love and what good does it do? How can we love the hell out of the world? These are the questions we are going to ask ourselves this morning.

Share the Plate on January 19: Christ the King Food Pantry in Mashpee continues to operate as a "Drive-Thru" service to provide its weekly pantry to clients and others. It is open Wednesdays from 9 AM -12 PM. In 2023, it served 5,780 families with an average of 112 families per week. Each week they give families five days of food. They are in the process of expanding so that they can serve more neighbors. Please give generously.

January 26 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—"Call and Response" led by Matt Meyer; service associate Judy Andrade. Singing out and singing together are part of the creation story of humanity. When our ancestors felt worried or alone, they called out into the darkness with song, and their community would respond in harmony. Join us for a service of song and silence, and an exploration of call and response. When times are uncertain, let's gather to celebrate the communities where we practice love and resilience.

Matt is a musician and worship leader who has led hundreds of services for UU congregations across the country. He has a degree in hand drumming and serves as Director of Community Life for Sanctuary Boston.

As we stand on the threshold of 2025, it is a fitting time to reflect on the nature of reality and our role in shaping it. The start of a new year often brings a sense of renewal and possibilities. It is a moment for introspection—an opportunity to examine how our beliefs and actions shape our daily experiences and the world around us. As members of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation, we are called to explore these ideas together because we understand that it is from the plurality of understanding that we ever get close to the truth of life.

Exploring our realities together encourages us to embody the principles of the Unitarian Universalist faith: acceptance, justice, and compassion. As we embark on this journey in the new year, let us commit to shaping a reality that reflects our highest values. This means actively engaging in self-reflection, having courageous conversations, and embracing the diversity of thought within our families and all the communities of which we are a part.

As we move forward together, let us remember that shaping our reality is not just an individual endeavor—it's a collective journey. When we share our thoughts and ideas openly, we have the power to influence our lives and those around us. In 2025, let us strive to weave a tapestry of compassion, understanding, and hope that extends beyond our congregation and into the wider world by sharing our thoughts and ideas widely.

Here is hoping that 2025 will help UU Falmouth expand in fellowship, sharing, and imagination.

Each of these six was a gifted person with a distinctive character and interests, all gave intellectual and social vibrancy to our common life. We think of them now with appreciation and love as this year of their passing ends.

People we all need to thank for outstanding service to the congregation: 2024 was a recovery year for UU Falmouth. The current governing board took office in July, 2023, and was still feeling in semi-crisis mode as 2024 began. I think the urgency was widely felt within the congregation, motivating people to work to rebuild what we had before COVID closed the Meeting House in March 2020. Many contributed to the effort so I don't want to leave out anyone, but among the many, a few stand out in my memory. COVID blew holes in our finances and membership. When 2024 began, we had no minister. Larry Ladd assembled and led the search team that brought us Reverend Rali in August 2024. Larry, thank you so very much. You are my nominee for UU Falmouth's Man-of-the-Year. David and Jessica Mark Welch chaired the pledge drive for FY25 that in dollar terms was the most successful we have ever had, and in human terms fielded an outstanding team that managed to meet personally with nearly all members and many friends. Heartfelt thanks to you.

We were without a minister but determined to be together for real Sunday services. **Julie DeSorgher** and **Judy Andrade** led the Religious Services Committee to create dignified, stimulating, illuminating services Sunday after Sunday, often leading from the pulpit as if trained for it. They called into being and coordinated the team that provided music, technology, seating, and heating so smoothly we scarcely realized it was being done. Thank you Julie and Judy.

After COVID lockdown, there was great hunger for social contact. **Carolyn Powers** provided Soul Matters seminars that were a hit and are continuing. **Joanne Treistman** brought us LINK, the popular year-long education series by the Wampanoag, as well as monthly Community Circles for members and the public. Both membership and fellowship are integral parts of our mission—thank you Carolyn and Joanne for doing so much to create the personal circles of relationship that knit the congregation into a whole.

The Miracle of Grocery Gift Cards

Start the year off by donating to charities at no cost to you! It can be done by *purchasing grocery cards* from the Social and Environmental Action Committee. Here's how it works:

You buy grocery cards for any of the following stores: *Windfall, Jack in the Beanstalk, Shaw's, Stop & Shop,* and *Roche Brothers.* (We are looking into Aldi's.) The cards are sold at face value in many denominations. You can use them online or in person, and you don't need to spend the entire card value at once. The stores then donate 5% of the sales to us, which the SEAC then donates to local charities. Thus there is a 5% donation generated at no cost to you!

We're hoping that more people purchase cards and see how easy it is! The cards also make great gifts.

"Exploring the Nature of Reality" Series Nodpositors From 7.9:15 BM at the Mosting He



2nd and 4th Wednesdays from 7-8:15 PM at the Meeting House and via Zoom (UU Falmouth only), beginning January 8, 2025

Please join us for a bi-weekly series "Exploring the Nature of "Reality." Each session will have a facilitator who will present different perspectives on reality and opportunities to explore them individually and as a group. This is the beginning of a pilot program that we may expand upon later.

January 8, 2025 – <u>Steve Treistman</u> – Reality is different for each of the creatures on earth, based upon their very different sensory systems. For example, stationary objects are invisible to some animals, becoming visible only when they move. Dogs experience a very different reality than we do, shaped as much by smell as by vision. What does the world look like to an insect, to a fish, to other creatures who share this planet? There are an infinite variety of realities being experienced at any given moment. The world is a richer place when we consider it from these different perspectives.

January 22, 2025 – <u>Rali Weaver</u> – We will deconstruct how religious thought influences our understanding of reality. Drawing from all the world's religions and various interpretations of theological thought from Calvinism to Bonhoeffer, we will explore how different theological concepts and their interpretations have affected the lived reality of adherents.

<u>Dan Joslyn</u> – Reality is relational as opposed to absolute and, as such, there is a quality of depth and interconnectedness that is hard to fathom. We use agreement as a way to label things. We do so in all directions and in all flavors of a thing to reach absolute agreement on what it is, causing disagreement about certitude.

<u>Rudolf Oldenbourg</u> – We learn about the world around us through our senses, of which we have five on first count: sight, hearing, smell, taste, and touch. From the time we are born, even before, our brain receives and integrates these different inputs and forms our experience of the world around us by literally recreating it. Because the brain recreates the outer world, the creation is necessarily subjective, as it is derived from the physical sensory inputs and their interpretation based on our past experiences. In my contribution to this series on reality as we experience it, I plan to examine the physical nature of the signals and the first steps of detecting them to form the input for our senses. Many of the contributions by others in this series are covering the further processing of these basic sensory inputs so we can survive, procreate, and together thrive in this world.

Lew Stern – What each of us experiences as "real" depends on who we are psychologically: our past experiences, beliefs, emotions, hopes, and perspectives. We also share group realities with those around us: our family, culture, and peers. We will explore our unique individual and shared realities and how they impact us by observing and participating in experiences together and in small groups.

<u>John Jackson</u> – How do we measure reality? John has spent his career "measuring." But is there a truly unambiguous value that can be attached to any of the things that we measure and feel comfortable assigning a number to?

<u>Jessica Mark Welch and Betsy Wilder</u> – We'll discuss the microbiome and our sense that we are human, but *in reality* are mostly microbial in terms of our cell numbers and DNA coding potential. Our microbiomes likely change our moods and behaviors as well as our health status.
