My Spiritual Director said, "Don't you remember how long Moses wandered in the wilderness?" I'll tell you why she asked and how remembering the wilderness time could inform our journey together.

Dear Folks of the Meeting House,

I sit down to write my monthly column on the first day of atrocious violence committed by Russia against the people of the Ukraine. I stared for a long time at a blank page, a blinking cursor, waiting for words to come.

In March we are asking the theological question “What does it mean to be a people of renewing faith?” And I wonder how to hold this hopeful message in such a time as this.

This invasion happens two years into a global pandemic. This invasion happens at a time when I, as a person, am tired. This invasion happens as the rest of the world prays for peace.

How can I renew my faith at this moment?

Perhaps the answer is this: it is a moment, precisely this moment, that I need to dig deeper into my faith in humanity. I need to reassert my belief that it is required of each of us to lift up the value of each person, to reassert my understanding that we are all interconnected.

My heart breaks not just for the civilians of the Ukraine, but for the Russian soldiers who will one day have to come to terms with the violence they brought down on their cousins. I hope my faith is strong enough to hold them in care when that time comes.

Faith is not easy. Cheap, knee-jerk reactions are easy. Faith is hard.

Faith doesn't mean that I have all of the answers, but that I must keep seeking them. Faith does not mean that I know what to do at this moment.

As the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. teaches us:

***Faith is taking the first step even when you don't see the whole staircase.***

My first step is to remember that I have faith in our shared humanity. My second step was to call the Priest of the nearest Ukrainian Orthodox Church, to offer assistance to their cleric, born himself in the Ukraine, and ask, clumsily, awkwardly and honestly, “Can I be of help?”

My third step is yet unknown. I can't see that far ahead, but I will keep stepping.

## GROUP PRAYING WITH THE BODY

Rev. Saramaria will guide us as we read a Psalm, then practice with gentle yoga poses (or you can just sit) and a brief meditation ending with a self-compassion practice. Pray with more than just your mind—learn how to use your whole self. Move in prayer by expressing the Psalms with motion. This way of praying helps deepen and broaden a practice. The four basic ways of praying –oral, mental, affective, and contemplative are involved. These meditations and reflections connect us to our deepest needs to be with the Beloved, to be reassured of the divine presence in our midst. Prayer With the Body addresses a hunger and longing for true happiness, freedom from fear, and provides deep peace. This is based on a book and practice by Roy DeLeon.





# In Memory of...

## Barbara Clements

March 5, 1935 - February 14, 2022



**Barbara Clements**, a retired nurse practitioner who specialized in gerontology, died February 14 with her sons beside her. Born in 1935 in Teaneck, NJ, Barbara graduated from Villa Madonna Academy near Covington, KY in 1952. She attended Rosemont College in Philadelphia for two years and earned a BSN from Columbia University School of Nursing in 1958. She went back to school after years of nursing and raising a family to earn an MSN from UMass Lowell in 1987.

Barbara worked multiple nursing jobs during her career, from private duty nurse and visiting nurse with Falmouth VNA to Director of Nursing at Falmouth Hospital, and finally as a nurse practitioner, providing primary health care at Tewksbury State Hospital. While living in Maine during the 1990's, she was instrumental in helping the National Organization of Nurse Practitioners implement legislation that defined administrative roles for nurse practitioners nationwide.

Barbara met Ted Clements while living in New York City; they were married in 1960 and later relocated to NJ, where they had four boys. In 1971, Barbara and the boys moved to Falmouth, where she remained until 1984, when she moved to Methuen, MA to attend UMass Lowell for her MSN. In 1991, she and her partner Carol Bailey relocated to Litchfield, ME, where Barbara worked at St. Mary's Hospital in Lewiston. They lived there until Carol's death in 2010, whereupon Barbara returned to Falmouth to be near her family.

Barbara was an avid reader and political activist, an active member of UU Falmouth, devoted to social justice and environmental conservation. Her wide range of activities included competitive swimming, choral singing, kayaking, wood and stone carving, and just about anything outdoors, especially on or near the beach. She enjoyed boating and fishing and was always first in the ocean well into her eighties.

A memorial service will be held at the UU Falmouth, date and time to be announced. (*Falmouth Enterprise*)

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*Barbara was a wonderful friend, who loved games, especially word games, and jigsaw puzzles. I enjoyed our breakfasts together with the Tuesday morning breakfast group and singing together in the choir (as a tenor/bass, Barbara was a valued member). She was one of the most intelligent, articulate people I have ever known, and I am really going to miss our long talks on topics both personal and far ranging. Barbara's friends have been blessed to have her in our lives! ~Judy Andrade*

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*Barb sang tenor and moved to bass when she could. She loved choir and lobster. We, the 4 Musketeers, had lobster once a year and it had to be hard shell. She was a strong woman. ~Reed Walsh*

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*Always felt a special bond with Barbara and was happy to find out she had a room at Royal nursing home of Falmouth across from my very good friend Sheila Payne. I introduced them to each other and the three of us even sang together a couple of times. Unfortunately, shortly thereafter Barbara got the diagnosis of lung cancer and lost her breath too easily. But she was always such a trooper and never forgot to show me her appreciation for my short visits, even right before she went to the hospital for the last time. ~Maria Moniz*

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*Barbara was an inspiration and a role model. One could say that she was like the Rock of Gibraltar - calm, steady, always there, reliable, supportive. Or she was like an oasis - nourishing and refreshing. Beyond that, she had a razor sharp intelligence and wit, and often a devilish twinkle in her eye. I always loved being with her. # In Memory Of...

## Paulette Loomis

June 26, 1925 - February 3, 2022



**Paulette Chapman Loomis** was born to the Rev. Paul Harmon Chapman and Edith Violet Lafferty Chapman on Staten Island, NY and grew up in Ohio and Massachusetts. She graduated in 1948 from the Rhode Island School of Design with a B.S. in Landscape Architecture, the first affirmation of her lifelong love of art. After working for several landscape architectural firms, she married Harvard graduate David B. Loomis. His career as a Unitarian minister took the family to several locations in the Boston area, allowing her to take classes at the School of the Museum of Fine Arts where she studied gold- and silversmithing.

After her three children were grown, she and David moved to Falmouth, MA where she took on new challenges in art, especially after Rev. Loomis' death in 1988. From 1985-1997 Paulette ran the Market Barn Gallery, attached to Market Book Shop, and chaired the Falmouth Cultural Council for six years. She was named a Local Treasure by the Massachusetts Cultural Council for her dedication to the arts. In 1998 she helped form the Committee to Encourage Public Art that spearheaded the creation of eleven bas-relief bronze plaques by Sarah Peters. These plaques, installed along the sidewalk in front of Falmouth Public Library, depict various industries that are part of Falmouth's history.

Paulette greatly enjoyed gardening, miniature painting and loved spending summers at the family's rustic cottage on the coast of Maine. Paulette was predeceased by her son Robert Harmon Loomis, daughter Vivienne Bullard Loomis, and "late in life love" Marius Breebart. She is survived by her daughter Laurel, son-in-law Karen Loomis, Lawrence Dulong, daughter-in-law, and four grandchildren.

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*It is sad to hear of the death of Paulette Loomis, a lovely and highly impressive woman who has been visited by UU Falmouth members for years before she moved from the area. Aside from being bright, personable and lovely, she was a talented artist, who somehow managed to continue her beautiful artwork even when she became blind. She was a pleasure to visit and spend time with, and it was disappointing when she told us she no longer wished to have us visit due to personal health issues. She was a proud and private person, but a gift to know. I love having memories of visiting with her! ~Judy Singer*

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*Paulette Loomis was a long-time member of UU Falmouth. She had to stop her involvement with the congregation due to her ill health and eventual move to central Massachusetts to an assisted living place close to her daughter Laurel and son-in-law Larry. After many years of sickness, she succumbed to her second bout with Covid on February 3rd at the age of 96. Paulette was an exceedingly smart, fascinating, kind, appreciative, and talented woman as a friend, artist, and gardener. Up until the early 1990's she was married to Rev. Dave Loomis, a UU minister. She got much happiness and gave it to others making music with her cello, metalsmithing, painting, sewing, and growing orchids. But perhaps her greatest legacy was how she touched so many people through her rich life of compassion and creative inspiration. Jean and I will miss her. ~Lew Stern*

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*Paulette was a dear friend. She shared seeds from climbing nasturtiums with me that graced my window boxes for several summers. She also enjoyed painting watercolors even as her eyesight began to fail. Before her eyesight began to diminish, she spearheaded an effort to create public art along Main Street in Falmouth. She and the Committee to Encourage Public Art raised funds, ran a competition for proposals, and selected Sarah Peters to create her bas relief design. Titled "Looking Back: Falmouth at Work," the eleven bronze plaques were installed in two sections as funding allowed in front of Falmouth Public Library.*

*I end with a quote from Paulette. Sam and I often drove her to the Meeting House for Sunday worship. She penned, "It does matter that we share our best together. There is ALWAYS an assist for my personal journey."*
