RELIGIOUS SERVICES IN MAY

Our Soul Matters Theme for May is “Awakening Curiosity.”

May 3 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—“All the Colors” led by Rev. Rali Weaver; service associate, Noreen Cavanaugh. This Sunday, we celebrate “All the Colors”—not just the ones we see in the garden, but the ones we carry within us. In our Unitarian Universalist tradition, we don’t just tolerate difference; we recognize that a monochrome community is a fragile one. Like the ribbons of a Maypole, our individual threads are different for a reason: because that is the only way to weave something strong enough to hold us all. **This is**

Flower Communion Sunday so everyone is encouraged to bring a flower for the communal vase.

May 10 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—“Looking Back and Moving On” led by Matt Meyer; service associate, Rev. Rali Weaver. Many traditions have passed down stories about the dangers of looking backwards or getting stuck in the past, but the past is always with us. Our stories and histories shape who we are and where we’re going. Special guest, Matt Meyer, will offer a service of song and story as we reflect on the past and find our way forward.

Matt is an itinerant troubadour and worship leader who has led hundreds of services for UU congregations across the country. He has a degree in hand drumming and serves as Director of Community Life for Sanctuary Boston.

Saturday May 16 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—Rev. Rali’s Installation Service. We’ll explore the radical joy of being a “multi-hue” community and ask ourselves: How do we grow our church in a healthy, happy way.

May 17 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—“Getting to Know You” and New Member Sunday led by Rev. Rali Weaver; service associate, Rosa Whiting. This Sunday, we celebrate one of the most joyful milestones in our congregational life: New Member Sunday. Our sermon, “Getting to Know You,” dives into the beautiful, messy, and decidedly slow process of building true connection. We’ll explore the reality that a meaningful relationship is a marathon, not a sprint. Truly seeing one another—beyond the nametags and the “how are you”s—requires the one thing our modern world seems short on: time.

Share the Plate on May 17 will go to the Health Imperatives; Hyannis Family Planning.

May 24 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—“Beginner’s Mind” led by Rev. Rali Weaver; service associate, Izzie Williams. “In the beginner’s mind there are many possibilities,” wrote Zen teacher Shunryū Suzuki, “but in the expert’s mind there are few.” As we reach the conclusion of our annual stewardship campaign, it’s easy to view our pledges and promises as a “done deal” or a box checked off a list. But what happens when we approach our commitment to this community with Shoshin—the Buddhist practice of the Beginner’s Mind? This Sunday, we explore the spiritual art of starting fresh. We will celebrate the generosity that sustains us while clearing away our preconceptions of what this fellowship “is,” making room for what it could be. Join us as we wrap up our stewardship season not with a sense of completion, but with the expansive openness of a new chapter.

May 31 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—“Care of the Soul” led by Rev. Bill Zelazny; service associate, Charlotte Harris. In 1992 Thomas Moore, psychologist, former monk, and author, wrote *Care of the Soul*. Rev. Bill will revisit some of Moore’s thoughts to explore how we might spend some quality time with ourselves to manage and shape living so as to give our ordinary life depth and value.

Rev. Bill Zelazny was ordained as a Unitarian Universalist minister in 1992. He has served four congregations, the most recent was Channing Memorial Church in Newport, RI from which he retired in June 2025.

Dear UU Falmouth Friends,

As we approach my upcoming installation, I find myself returning to a simple, rhythmic image: a stone skipping across the water. Each contact between the stone and the surface sends out a vibration—small and focused at first, then widening into concentric rings until it reaches distant, unseen shores. Ralph Waldo Emerson captured this beautifully in his essay *Circles*, noting:

“The heart refuses to be imprisoned; in its first and narrowest pulses, it already tends outward with a vast force, and to immense and innumerable expansions.”

That is exactly how I envision our ministry together. It isn't just about what happens within the four walls of our Meeting House; it is about the expanding ripples of our values moving through the world.

It is my hope that the installation on May 16th is a reaffirmation of our covenant. Emerson reminds us that “around every circle another can be drawn; that there is no end in nature, but every end is a beginning.” This milestone isn't the “completion” of our work, but the starting point for a new, larger circle of influence.

When we show up with genuine kindness and a visible sense of joy, we signal to the Upper Cape community that we are a living, breathing community ready and willing to invite them in. We draw others in, not through slick marketing, but through the “vast force” of a welcome that feels alive. We are building a space where:

- New generations feel an immediate sense of belonging,
- Social justice efforts create tangible change beyond our doors, and
- Spiritual growth is nurtured at every age and stage of life.

It is easy to underestimate the “minor” deeds—a warm greeting at the door, a card of caring, a ride to church, a thoughtful message of inclusion, or the shared silence of meditation. Yet, Emerson suggests that our lives are built on these expanding actions: “Step by step we scale this mysterious ladder: the steps are actions; the lives we lead are the wheels of this chariot.” Every small act of service sends out invisible waves that touch people we may never meet. They plant seeds of change in places we cannot yet see.

As we prepare for this celebration, what is one “ripple” of kindness or justice you've seen lately that you'd like to see expand further into the Upper Cape community?

Hello Members and Friends,

It's mid-spring and that's budget planning and stewardship campaign time. Committees plan and submit requests to the Financial Committee. Then Fin Com looks at the utilities, insurances, and other fixed expenses for changes in demand and costs. The Investment Committee reviews rates of interest income and how much to draw on it. The Stewardship chairs seek volunteers and together with the Governing Board judge the mood and capacity of the congregation for the next round of pledging.

On one hand, last year the congregation responded so positively to the call for pledges to afford a full-time Minister, plus their own household expenses have gone up since then. On the other hand, expenses are likely to rise for the Meeting House, its personnel and activities. On balance, we opted to ask for a cost of living increase for FY27.

So, as you could expect, the Board meeting was pretty dry, mostly money talk. This year's budget is holding up well: we spent over budget for snowplowing, kitchen equipment and technology; failed to budget for Minister's professional expenses, so had to juggle line items; and had to absorb a big increase in liability insurance. Nevertheless, we're on track to end the year with a surplus. This is our pattern and the way we have built our savings over many years until we now have just over \$800,000 in money market and investment funds.

The April 16th Board meeting focused on the FY26-27 budget proposed by the Finance Committee. We supported several increases they proposed, including a new line item for \$5,000 for the minister's professional expenses as we have done for other ministers, both called and interim; \$4,900 for paid choir participants; \$4,000 for snow removal; \$10,000 for the facilities reserve; and \$5,000 for religious education to hire a Sunday school support person. The stewardship campaign is underway with 32 canvassers. And we will continue to ask members and friends for money for the operating budget only once a year, and that ask is now – your pledge for FY27.

In other business, Rali's installation weekend (May 15-17) is shaping up with a catered Friday event, Saturday activities and ceremony, and New Members Sunday finale. And Maureen McGiver was welcomed as the new coffee person and RE helper.

Friday, May 1 & 29 at 4 PM at the Meeting House and via Zoom

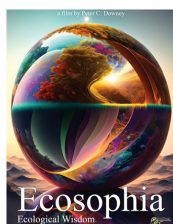

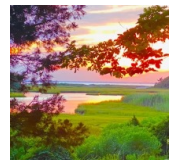
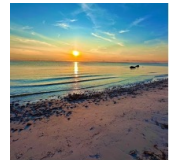
