### **RELIGIOUS SERVICES IN NOVEMBER**

November 2 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—"From Scarcity to Gratitude" led by Rev. Rali Weaver; service associate, Joanie Thompson. This Sunday, we're diving deep into the powerful shift from scarcity to abundance. So often, we unknowingly limit our ability to fully appreciate the richness of our lives by focusing on what's missing. But what happens when we open our hearts to a mindset of abundance? Together, we'll explore how to break free from this narrow view, discover the transformative power of gratitude, and take steps toward embracing a life of generosity and openness.

November 9 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—"The Faces of Extremism: Confronting Violence and Inciting Peace" led by Rev. Rali Weaver; service associate, Carolyn Powers. Extremism in all its forms—whether political, religious, or ideological—breeds violence and division. From street protests to online hate, we witness the destructive power of rigid beliefs that justify harm. This Sunday, we reflect on how extremists commit violence, not just with fists, but with words and ideologies. What can we do to counter this? Join us as we explore how to confront hatred with compassion and stand against violence in all its forms.

November 16 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—"Good Fences Make Good Neighbors"

led by Rev. Rali Weaver; service associate, Tom Kirkman. In this Sunday's service, we explore the complex role that boundaries play in our lives—both in our relationships with others and with ourselves. Boundaries are often seen as essential for self-care, personal growth, and maintaining healthy interactions. But are there times when they can isolate us or create unnecessary divisions? Join us as we reflect on how setting and respecting boundaries can both protect and limit us.

November 23 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—"Life on the Gender Continuum" led by Rev. Rali Weaver; service associate, Scott Fitzmaurice. We will explore the fluid and diverse nature of gender, embracing it as a spectrum rather than a fixed binary. By reflecting on the teachings of love, acceptance, and justice, we seek to understand how our Unitarian Universalist values call us to honor and celebrate the unique identities of all people.

November 30 at 10 AM at the Meeting House and via Zoom—"The Texture of Our Lives" led by Ellen Todd; service associate, Izzie Williams. A few months ago, another member of our Fellowship noticed that I was knitting before the service. She is also a knitter and challenged me to do a sermon on knitting. After giving it some thought, I realized that knitting makes a good metaphor for life. Sometimes we do everything right and are pleased with what we've easily created. Other times, we make mistakes, figure out how to fix them and end up pleased with our results. And, sometimes we make such a tangled mess that we have to throw things out and start over. Most of us experience more than one of these as we create the texture of our lives.

Dear UU Falmouth Friends,

While ritual practice is not prescribed in our UU context, it remains critical, in part, because it facilitates deeper connections and helps us get to know one another better. During Joys and Concerns, when you pick up one rock or three, whether you choose a small or large one, your community witnesses this, and this public acknowledgment validates your experience. It deepens our sense of belonging and connection to share them each week, even if we never write down what we carry or say the words.

This ritual is also important because it strengthens our sense of compassion and fosters caring for one another. Sharing sorrows is a form of burdensharing; it allows the community to lend its strength and support, thereby lessening the individual's load. Whether this ritual takes 2, 5, or 15 minutes, we know it is the time that is needed to hold each other in care, sympathy, and celebration.

Bringing your concerns and joys to this place, which many of us call home, can also help build your resilience. By giving voice to a positive experience, the community helps to amplify your joy, reinforcing that good feeling and creating positive emotional resources. Sharing a struggle, on the other hand, provides the cathartic release necessary for emotional healing.

After my mother died, I felt as if my grief was amorphous and untenable, affecting all parts of my life. When I finally started attending a grief group at my local UU church, I started to have a place for my grief to go, and I began to feel as if I could breathe again, and my anger dissipated. Having a dedicated, safe place to express sorrow helps us contain the pain and live more fully, and having a place to share joy helps us feel less alone, because shared joy is multiplied joy. This is what I think a spiritual community is good for, if we let it: witnessing our lives. This requires us to play our part, though. We need to be willing to be vulnerable and share our lives with a community if we want it to witness our lives.

There are so many opportunities to share your lives here at UU Falmouth: Community Circles, Grief Group, Sermon Discussions, Soul Matters, Men's Breakfast, Walking Groups, Spirituality Discussion, just to name a few. Even our committee work, social action, or any place we gather together can be a space where we witness each other's lives with care and compassion. I hope that we continue to practice expanding our sense of care and compassion for everyone, so that as we grow and invite more people to join us, our sense of community will also continue to grow. The more we share our emotional reality and ritualize our caring, the stronger and more connected our entire community becomes.

### Governing Board Report



(Phil kindly agreed to write this report while Charlotte was away.) Dear Members and Friends,

Before I report and expand on the agenda items that were before the Governing Board meeting on Thursday, 16 October, I would like to take a personal moment to reflect on the progress that we have made as a fellowship over these last months. We all should be proud! It feels like a new place; a new hope. It's just great to see the Fellowship so vibrant again...and, after all, vice presidents don't get to do this too often.

We have made wonderful advancements in ministerial fellowship, growth, and Meeting House improvements. We have a new settled minister, very healthy membership and financial growth—and everything from a 21st century environmentally friendly new and improved interior environmental control system with excellent indoor air quality (now completely paid for, I might add); a new audio/visual system in the sanctuary; a refurbished parking lot; recently cleaned sanctuary and atrium carpets; and now a new high temperature state-of-the-art sterilizing dishwasher! We are firing on all cylinders!

It's been a busy month at the Meeting House with seminars, workshops, and new upcoming events being planned, so be on the lookout for these when reading your *Sandscript*.

Of course, the work of the Governing Board is never finished! The board was asked by Building and Grounds to continue to support our Green Sanctuary sustainable design philosophy used in making energy, material, and indoor air quality decisions. Rev. Rali is going to be researching the latest ideas from UUA on this and will be reporting to the board. The board was also asked to consider whether to support several proposals for consideration at General Assembly. These will require the support of 15 UU congregations. Rev. Rali will be providing more information to the board before any final decision is made. One proposal requests that the UUA create a task force to review the Ministerial Fellowship Committee (MFC) polices as they relate to Interim and Developmental Ministries. Another proposes to amend the UUA bylaws by providing compensation during a minister's suspension from fellowship, and the policies defining permissible compensation will also be under consideration.

The Governing Board, in executive session, selected John Jackson to fill the open director's seat and John has graciously accepted! We wholeheartedly thank John for being willing to step up and serve in this important position.
